



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History of the Class of 1925


We, the class of nineteen hundred twenty-five, entered Villisca High School one Monday morning the first of September, the year nineteen hundred twenty-one. Some were so anxious to get here, they came as early as eight o'clock, others were so afraid to come that they came a day or two, even a week late. When we had all collected, ther were about sixty—sixty green and growing freshman, eyes and ears open. Some even went so far as to open their mouths. The boys were given the privilege to open their mouths even more one night after school when all upper-classmen ordered them to "line up, pull out their shirt tails and forward march." At that time, we had barrels at each corner of the square. The boys were ordered to sing solos at each corner of the square, standing on the barrels, and try out their wonderful voices. We went to Creston for our class picnic and had a dandy time. The class sponsors treated us that evening to a picture show before coming home.

Our last and only year has been the best of all. We had four men on the very successful championship football team. They were Cropp, Enarson, Goldberry and Dunn. We feel proud of the fact that these four helped make it a championship team. The basketball team was also very successful. Cropp was again captain and Enarson played on the team. The team won the sectional tournament and Cropp was chosen as captain and center of the all tournament team. Our boys also won class series in basketball. Childs was again manager of the Athletic Association. The girls were represented on girls basketball teams.





Again, Again on September, seventh, nineteen twentyfive we shall enter our Sophomore year and start with even more school spirit than we have had this year.

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

WILLIAM FREELAND Forward


Freeland did his share in making the team a success. He is a hard player and when sent into games did his share. With another year left to play he should make a good man.




Toasts were given by different members of the classes. The Juniors presented a clever little play as a part of the program, and also gave the future of the members of the Senior class.
