JUDY WALLACE

The Iowa High School Girls Athletic Union each year holds a free throw contest in connection with the State Basketball Tournament series. At each Sectional Tournament site two girls from each participating school may enter as contestants. At the Villisca site this year Judy won first honors by making 22 baskets out of 25 attempts. Joan Guss of Villisca was second with 21 out of 25. Both were presented trophies and earned the right to compete in district competition.



HISTORY OF THE NODAWAY SCHOOLS

Nodaway, as every other community in this great nation of ours, was once uninhabited. Then people moved west and as they moved and settled in small groups, a great need arose--a need for a school, a place to educate their children. So the need arose in Nodaway. The first school in Nodaway opened in the year 1869. A building was erected that year on the present school property near or on the site of the present custodian's home. Ten years later, the building became inadequate and was sold to the Presbyterian Church for a house of worship. The structure was moved from the original site to the south, near the present Dever lot. When it became too small for this purpose, it was moved to the business district where it housed a number of business concerns including the village printing office and the office of the town's first garage. It was finally torn down in the fall of 1934.

The record of the school elections gives March 10, 1873 as the first held in this independent district. At this election, Marshall Bullock, A. G. Kennon and Mr. Merrick were elected directors. With the school permanently organized, new and increasing interest was taken in it. As immigration continued westward and interest in scholarship increased, a new and larger school house was built in 1879. This was a two story frame building and was built at the site of the old building.

Professor Worley was the first principal. He had sixty-five pupils and but one assistant. The same three rooms were utilized and with steadily increasing attendance, the school made rapid progress. During all this time, the home interest in the school was increasing and scholars outside were anxiously seeking admission into what was then considered the second best school in the county.

About 1885, opposing factions from outside the district succeeded in reducing our territory from thirteen to two sections, leaving a scholarship of sixty-five. Having now lost our independence, the township board was charitable enough to allow Nodaway one teacher at thirty-five dollars per month. Accepting the situation, the best instructors possible were employed. A few of these were Professor Howard of Nebraska, Mrs. Emma Carlisle, A. J. Linn, Howard Russell, Mr. Blick, Miss Mary Sawyer, A. C. Peckham, and others. By 1891, there were eighty-five pupils in school with one teacher, Mrs. Oscar Starr.

With this increased enrollment, the people were naturally inclined to return to independence again. This, after a bitter contest, was effected in 1900, with our district boundary remaining unchanged.

As progress continued, the people became dissatisfied with a two-year high school. So in 1905, a four-year high school was organized and was handled by one teacher, Professor C. V. Frazier.

In 1908, a brick building was erected just south of the present building at the cost of \$4,000. This building was much better equipped to care for the twelve grades. In 1909, Nodaway graduated its first senior class of only two members, Miss Bessie Norcutt (McGoy) and Mr. Wilbert Shipley.

In the year 1915, a keen interest developed for extra-curricular activities, so basketball and declamation were added to the course of study. The growing interest in public declamation suggested to the faculty that there might be talent dormant in some of the students. So plans for a mid-winter contest were laid and soon ten eager contestants were in the race for honors. Mrs. Ida C. Robb of Creston was employed to train the contestants. The students were entirely inexperienced, but with a week of careful training, Mrs. Robb was able to produce a decided change in the character of their work. The contest was held with Harry Moore winning first over all, and Gwendoline Gibson, second. The first prize was a \$5 gold piece and second \$2.50.

The first boys' basketball team to represent N. H. S. was in 1915. This inexperienced team made a good showing, although working under poor conditions. The members of the team were Myron Taylor, Ned Eastlack, Clyde Willett, Frank Copeland, Fred Wilson, and William Gibson.

The first girls' basketball team made its appearance in 1916. Working dilligently, the team developed rapidly and made a very good record for the season. The members of the team were Genevieve Eastlack, Anonelle Gidley, Geraldine Shane, Inez Moser, Vivian Carothers, Ida Devers, and Marianne Wilson.

When consolidated school districts became popular, the parents in the Nodaway district became interested. In 1919, five rural districts voted to consolidate with the Nodaway school and the wealth, students, and interest of 24 sections were centered in one school. School opened in the fall of 1919 with E. E. Kuhn as superintendent and a supporting staff of six teachers. The school building was entirely inadequate to house the increased enrollment and the Vaughn Hotel building was purchased for the elementary department.

On June 14, 1921, the consolidated district voted bonds for the erection of a new \$80,000 school building. Work was begun on it almost immediately, and in the fall of 1922, school opened in a building second to none in any district of our size that we knew about.

In 1930, the increased enrollment was a deciding factor in another change in the school. The eight elementary grades were housed on the second floor and were very crowded while the high school had plenty of room on the third floor. After due consideration, the eighth grade was moved to the third floor and became a part of the high school organization. The following year, the seventh grade was also moved to this organization and the school was completely organized into a 6-6 plan.

In October, 1933, it was decided to landscape the grounds surrounding the school building. After a meeting, plans were made to level the playground and athletic field south of the building. Eighty friends and patrons using 45 head of horses, in seven days moved over two thousand yards of dirt entirely without monetary cost to the district. This greatly improved the appearance of the grounds. As time has gone on other improvements have been made by the planting of trees and shrubs. Along with beautifying the grounds, the idea of making it a playground was not forgotten. Slides, swings, and baseball fields were added for the amusement of the students.

As time moves on, changes again are taking place and now the community has decided to no longer maintain a High School; so on July 1, 1959, Nodaway Consolidated School will no longer exist but in its place a larger unit will evolve, the Villisca Community School.

Yes, Nodaway High School will no longer exist but it cannot be forgotten for there is left a host of friends and graduates; people who will relive the memories of time spent with their classmates.

To help keep alive the spirit that has existed in building the school, the class of '59 have brought together in this book many pictures of friends and incidents. The class hopes this book will help you to hold these cherished memories. They also wish to thank everyone who has had a part in making this memory possible.

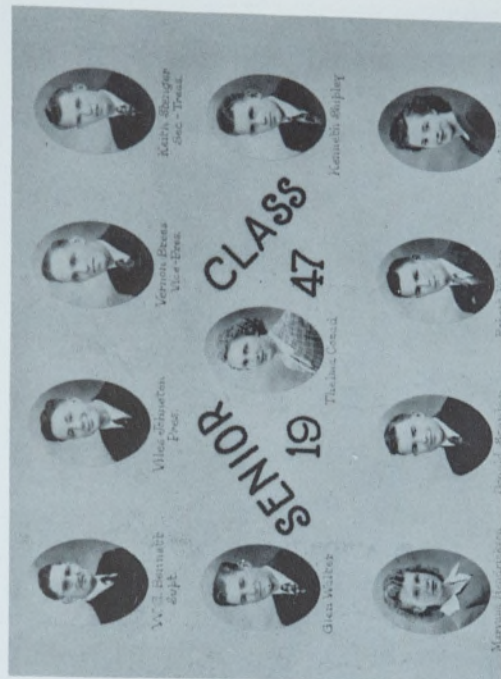

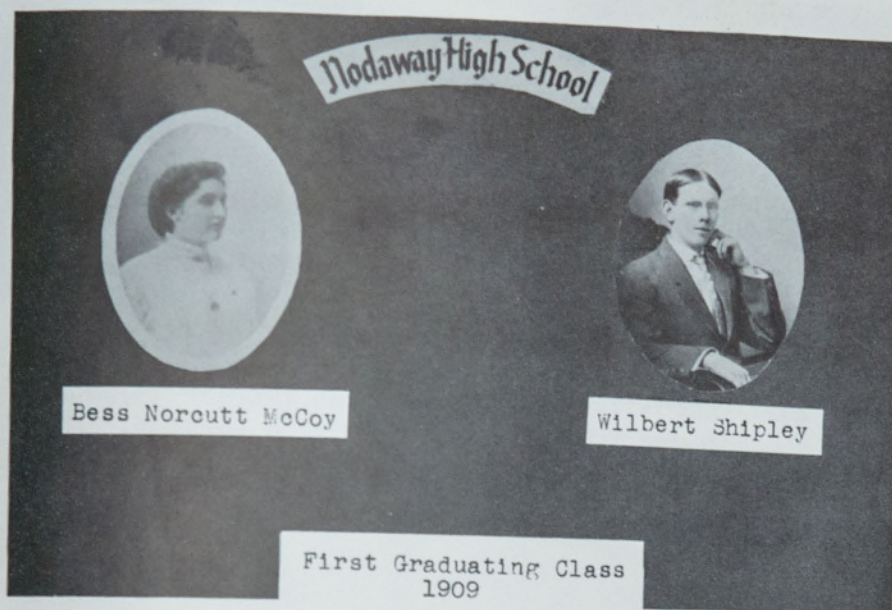

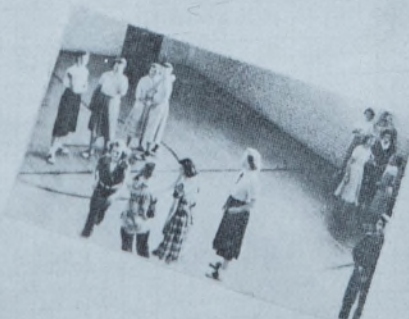

THE METHODIST CHURCH

1864

The first religious gathering in this vicinity with an idea of forming a church was held in a school house known as the Dennis White School, south of the Nodaway cemetery. That same year, Marshall Bullock and family emigrated from Ohio and settled in this valley. Since there was no pastor here, he went to Quincy and asked a circuit rider, Father Sheets, to hold a series of meetings which he did. A number of persons were converted, and the group members were organized as a Methodist Church called the Pleasant Valley Appointment.

In 1869, the group moved their place of worship to the schoolhouse in Nodaway. Interest grew and by 1881 a new church was dedicated. With continued growth in membership a need for a new parsonage was voiced and by 1901 money was made available for a new minister's home.

By 1903 the membership had enlarged and become so interested in the religious welfare of the Nodaway community that \$6,000 was provided to build a new church. This edifice served as a place of worship until 1919 when fire destroyed the building. Several years passed before a new church could be financed. In 1924, however, the present building was erected.

From 1864 to 1959 thirty-five ministers have served the church, helping to build a worth-while community.
